

We were visited by Ofsted...





As you are aware, we were eagerly waiting for Ofsted to complete our registration inspection to officially transition to Sapience Girls Academy. This was a monumental step with regards to the changes that we have implemented, and supports our trajectory and vision for the school. Alhamdullilah we can now share that we have successfully passed our registration inspection. The inspection further cemented the success of our changes, each department was highly praised and commended in the inspection feedback. We would like to thank our Senior Leadership Team and teaching staff for their hard work and endeavours, who Ofsted recognised as 'role models' for all pupils. We would also like to thank our students who impressed Ofsted with their 'confidence and passion for the school'. Finally, we would like to extend our appreciation for all parents and their consistent cooperation and support. May Allah SWT grant Sapience Girls Academy endless success and make it a beacon of educational excellence, Ameen.

In her report published last month, Ms Darley had high praise for the curriculum which is "informed by the school's Islamic ethos" and offers a broad range of core and additional subjects.

The pre-inspection for Sapience Girls Academy likewise looks promising as Ofsted found a number of changes had taken place to the school in the last 12 months, including its leadership and developing trustee board.

When it came to the physical premises, Ofsted found the school to be a "pleasant place to learn" as classrooms are well-maintained with natural light and plenty of space.

A Day with a Refugee...



This book is an inspirational and moving story illustrating the trials and turbulent journey of a refugee child, fleeing from war and struggle. The workshop was delivering in an engaging and interactive manner, and provided us with a unique opportunity to learn life lessons which we will carry with us and utilise.

We wrote letters to refugees sharing supportive words. We were also honoured to be the first school to received signed copies of Josee's new book. We are very privileged that we were able to access an established author and hear incredible stories with inspirational messages. The session left us all feeling grateful and thankful for all that we have, it allowed us to acknowledge the difficult times people are facing and to say Alhamdullilah for everything.


